For more than 30 years, the **Christmas Hamper Project** has supplied thousands of Ottawa families and individuals with boxes of food, toiletries and small gifts to help make their Christmas season a little brighter.

Hosted by Centretown United Church, hampers will be delivered to 160 families and individuals who have been referred by a number of Centretown emergency food providers.

Financial Update

All present indications are that we will come in under budget this year. We now expect our expenditures to be about forty thousand under estimates. This is because we have not had a full-time minister since the end of June and one of our choir directors took unpaid leave this Fall. This means we will be transferring less money from our trust funds than originally predicted. We had expected to transfer close to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) to balance the budget. We will probably only have to transfer sixty thousand. This is a transfer of capital so it reduces the size of the trusts.

With respect to congregational givings, we are down about seven thousand, close to ten percent, year-to-date. Any little extra that you might be able to contribute, would be a great help in reducing that shortfall

Our draft budget for next year will go to Council for review in November. We are working hard to have a balance budget for 2010. For us, a balanced budget includes income (return on investment) from the funds the trustees manage, but does not include the use of any capital. This is certainly much better news than we had at this time last year. If we can balance our budget we can focus on finding a bit more money to be used specifically to achieve our mission and vision, not just to keep the doors open.

We thank everyone for their continued generosity.

One member of our congregation put aside a toonie each week and at the end of the year was able to give an addition \$104 to the church. She challenges others to do the same and, if you take up the challenge, we will tell you who that person is.

Thanks to Mert Fraser for arranging for the catering and to Marjorie Morgan for organizing the pies. And a special thank-you to Jim and Karen Fee for organizing and leading the sing-song. The small profit was given to the fellowship petty-cash.

The <u>Fall Celebration</u>, held October 18th, was also a success. There was no charge for this event. Participants were asked to bring sandwiches, pies were donated for dessert. Many from the congregation stayed for lunch and about 30 to 40 remained to participate in the games. A great time was had by all solving puzzles, playing bingo, winning prizes, and most important of all, getting to know each other. Thanks again to Marjorie Morgan for organizing the pies and to Nancy Desjardins and Myrtle Fraser for the decorations. Thanks to all the committee for clean-up.

The <u>Future</u>. We hope to have a social event each month. Some will have a charge attached to cover expenses and/or raise some money for a specific fund or cause. We would like anyone or group who would like to sponsor an event to let any member of the committee know. If there is to be a charge, we would appreciate knowing how much and where the proceeds will be directed towards. To date activities are planned through February.
